### **Course Description**

**Course Title:** *New and Emerging Migrations*

**Course Listing:** International Studies 620 Sec. 2

**Dates:** June 23-27, 2008

### **Description: K-12 Teacher Workshop**

Elementary, Middle and High School teachers: earn one graduate credit for this one-week course which will focus on key contemporary issues relating to migration. Topics include immigrant communities, forced migration, return and circular migration, EU and US immigration policy, European migration, tolerance, social adaptation and integration, women and migration, identity, and literary representations of migration.

Learn about the issues relating to contemporary migration in Europe and beyond. What lessons can we learn from current migration debates in Europe and from European immigration policy? What are the specific economic conditions for migration and what social issues develop from migration both in the host and the home countries? How is migration – and more specifically how are migrant communities - presented in the media, and how has public opinion changed in recent years? What contributions have recent migrant communities made to the arts and culture of both their host and home countries?

Workshop participants will be given time during the workshop to discuss curriculum development ideas, and are expected to evaluate the best ways in which the themes of the workshop can be integrated into classroom instruction. The aim of the Workshop is for participants specifically to be able to develop curriculum modules on aspects of migration, and more generally to promote and develop the internationalization of K-12 education.

Speakers at the workshop include leading faculty at the UW-Madison and the University of Delaware (from the Departments of History, German, English, French, and Political Science and International Relations), as well as academics from the fields of Education Policy and Cultural Anthropology.
